Vermont residency required, unless otherwise specified

The Vermont Student Assistance Corporation (VSAC) publishes this booklet to provide you with information about specific scholarships available to Vermont residents. Most of the scholarships listed are sponsored by private groups, including Vermont businesses, charitable or service organizations, veterans groups, and others.

The majority of financial aid available to Vermont students is provided by your postsecondary school, the federal government, and VSAC. Scholarships are considered supplements to other aid, such as grants and loans.

Scholarships, like grants, are forms of “gift aid,” meaning there is no obligation (under most circumstances) to repay the funds. While grants are generally awarded according to financial need, scholarships are typically based on factors unique to each scholarship. These may include residency, degree program or major, academic achievement, extracurricular activities, and — in some cases — financial need.

Remember that when you apply for scholarships, you will be competing against other students who apply. Keep in mind, though, that if a scholarship is based on academic achievement, you may not have to be the best student in your class; you simply need to be the best student applying for that scholarship. Similarly, if a scholarship is based on financial need, your need will be compared only to the need of other applicants within that scholarship pool.

What to watch out for when searching for scholarships

How will scholarships affect other aid?

Before applying for scholarships, check with your college or postsecondary school to see how receiving a scholarship may affect your overall financial aid. Carefully consider whether or not a scholarship will:

- reduce loans
- reduce work-study
- reduce grants
- reduce other scholarships

Beware of scams

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) warns students to be careful in using scholarship search companies. While some firms are legitimate, others aren't. A tip-off could be if the firm "guarantees" or "promises" scholarships or grants. No reputable firm can legitimately make such a claim. Beware of these telltale statements:

"This scholarship is guaranteed or your money back."

"You can't get this information anywhere else."

"We'll need your credit card or bank account number to hold this scholarship."

"We'll do all the work for you!"

"There's a fee to apply for this scholarship."

"You've been selected by a national foundation to receive a scholarship."

"You're a finalist ..." (in a contest you never entered)

General information about scholarships

The scholarships listed in this booklet are divided into two categories:

VSAC-assisted scholarships — administered in part or in full by VSAC. These scholarships, which use VSAC's Unified Scholarship Application process, are listed on pages 6–26 in alphabetical order by their VSAC ID. To apply for these scholarships, use the instructions on pages 2–3, and the forms and attachments on pages 35–40.

other scholarships — administered by agencies or organizations other than VSAC. Each of these scholarships, which are listed on pages 42–53 in alphabetical order by name, has its own application process; VSAC forms cannot be used to apply. Refer to the toolbar codes on page 41 and follow instructions under the “Application” section of each scholarship listing.

We note the average number of applicants and awards in order to indicate the level of competition for each scholarship. If you have questions about a particular scholarship, contact VSAC's Scholarships Program.

VSAC-assisted scholarships timeline

Starting October 2009

- Review scholarships and identify those for which you meet all eligibility requirements.

After December 1, 2009

- Complete and submit the Unified Scholarship Application (USA).
- Begin submitting all additional required documents for the scholarships for which you are applying.

After January 1, 2010

- Go to www.fafsa.ed.gov to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon after January 1 as possible. This is often a requirement for scholarships that consider financial need.

Before February 12, 2010: Early birds!

- *To be entered in a drawing for one of three \$1,000 scholarships, apply early:* Make sure that all required documents for VSAC-assisted scholarships are post-marked no later than February 12. See complete official rules at www.vvac.org/scholarships.

Before March 5, 2010

- Make certain that all required documents for all scholarships to which you are applying have been postmarked no later than March 5.

When & where to look for scholarships

Begin your search for scholarships 9 to 12 months before the start of the academic year for which you need funds. Start close to home and branch out (local, regional, statewide, and then national) as time allows. Here are some additional sources of scholarship information:

VSAC Resource Center — located in the VSAC building in downtown Winooski. The center offers:

- computers with software and Web access to search national scholarship databases
- a library of more than 8,200 books, periodicals, and DVDs with detailed information about the financial aid process, college planning, and career exploration
- advisors to answer your questions and provide information

Appointments aren't necessary, and services are free.

local high school, businesses, clubs, or town officials

— information on scholarships restricted to your local school, town, or region

your college or university — information on scholarships restricted to the college or postsecondary school you attend

on the Web — visit www.vvac.org to learn about Vermont-specific scholarships or to use our online library catalog to borrow materials from the VSAC Resource Center through your school or local library; visit the following sites for information about national scholarships:

Remember that scholarships awarded in 2010 are applied toward education expenses in the 2010–2011 academic year.

Instructions for VSAC-assisted scholarships

Applying for VSAC-assisted scholarships is easy if you follow the steps outlined below. Applicants who attempt to apply without following these steps usually have difficulty understanding and completing the process successfully.

Step 1: Make sure you are eligible to apply for VSAC-assisted scholarships.

- You must be a Vermont resident and a United States citizen or be an eligible noncitizen to apply for VSAC-assisted scholarships (unless a particular scholarship specifies otherwise).
 - 1) If you are not sure you are a Vermont resident, request a copy of VSAC’s residency brochure or call the VSAC Scholarships Program.
 - 2) For financial aid purposes, an eligible noncitizen is one of the following:
 - a U.S. permanent resident who has a Permanent Resident Card (I-551 or I-151)
 - a conditional permanent resident (I-551C)
 - a noncitizen with an Arrival-Departure Record (I-94) from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) (specifically, the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services) showing any of the following designations: “Refugee,” “Asylum Granted,” “Paroled,” (the I-94 must confirm “paroled for a minimum of one year and status” has not expired), “Conditional Entrant” (valid only if issued before April 1, 1980), or “Cuban-Haitian Entrant, status pending.”
 - a student who holds a T-visa (for victims of human trafficking) or whose parent holds a T-visa.
 - 3) U.S. military personnel must have Vermont listed as their “home of record.”
 - 4) Dependency status is generally determined by the federal FAFSA methodology.

Step 2: File a FAFSA.

Scholarships that list financial need in their eligibility and selection criteria require the applicant to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Step 3: Scan VSAC-assisted scholarships using toolbars.

Each scholarship has a toolbar that provides the most common eligibility criteria. These toolbars can help you scan for scholarships for which you might be most eligible. The key below tells you what the toolbar categories mean.

This scholarship identifier is a VSAC code. Use this code to look up scholarships on the required documents chart (pages 28–33). When you begin your application, list this code in “Section II: Scholarships” of the Unified Scholarship Application (USA) on pages 35–36.

STUDENT indicates what type of student is eligible to apply.

Adult students* only: Applicant must be an independent student who:

- is 24 years or older; or
- is married or in a civil union; or
- is a veteran of the U.S. armed forces; or
- is currently serving on active duty in the U.S. armed forces for purposes other than training; or
- is an orphan or ward of the court; or
- has children and is providing more than half the children’s support

Current college students only: Applicant must be a student already enrolled in and attending postsecondary school.

Graduate students only: Applicant must have already obtained a four-year, undergraduate degree and be enrolled in graduate or professional-level coursework.

High school students only: Applicant must be a high school senior who will have earned either a high school diploma or GED by the start of the upcoming school year.

High school or college students: Applicant may be a high school senior who will have earned either a high school diploma or GED by the start of the upcoming school year, OR be a student already enrolled in and attending postsecondary school.

Any student may apply: There are no requirements as to the type of student who may apply.

** Definitions and guidelines for independent/adult students may change for 2010–2011. Please call VSAC if you are unsure of your independent/adult status.*

PROGRAM indicates the type of college or training program in which you must be enrolled.

Cert/Degree: Applicant must be enrolled in a certificate program or a degree program (undergraduate, graduate, or professional).

Cert/Undergrad: Applicant must be enrolled in a certificate program OR an undergraduate associate's or bachelor's degree program.

Cert/ND/Undergrad: Applicant must be enrolled in a certificate program, a non-degree program, OR an undergraduate associate's or bachelor's degree program.

Degree: Applicant must be enrolled in a degree program (undergraduate, graduate, or professional).

Grad/Profess: Applicant must already have received a bachelor's degree and be enrolled in a graduate or professional degree program.

Undergrad: Applicant must be enrolled in an undergraduate associate's or bachelor's degree program.

Undergrad/Grad: Applicant must be enrolled in either an undergraduate associate's or bachelor's degree program OR a graduate or professional degree program.

Any program: There are no requirements as to the type of program in which you enroll.

ENROLLMENT indicates the minimum enrollment required for you to be eligible to apply.

Full time: Applicant must be enrolled at least full time (minimum 12 credits per term).

3/4 time: Applicant must be enrolled at least three-quarter time (minimum 9 credits per term).

1/2 time: Applicant must be enrolled at least half time (minimum 6 credits per term).

1/4 time: Applicant must be enrolled at least quarter time (minimum 3 credits per term).

Any enrollment: There are no requirements as to the number of credits you take.

DURATION indicates whether the scholarship is for one year only or may be renewed for two, three, or four years.

1 year: Recipient will receive this scholarship for one year only.

2 years: Recipient will receive this scholarship for the first year and will have an opportunity to renew it for a second year.

3 years: Recipient will receive this scholarship for the first year and will have an opportunity to renew it for a second and third year.

4 years: Recipient will receive this scholarship for the first year and will have an opportunity to renew it for a second, third, and fourth year.

Step 4: Identify the VSAC-assisted scholarships for which you will apply.

- Carefully read each VSAC-assisted scholarship description (pages 6–26).
- If you meet all criteria in the toolbar AND you meet the additional criteria specific to that scholarship, then you are eligible to apply for that scholarship. *Most applicants will identify between six and eight VSAC-assisted scholarships for which they are eligible to apply.*
- Some scholarships will indicate that you must demonstrate financial need and/or academic achievement. Don't let this discourage you from applying; the scholarship committee will compare your financial need and/or academic achievement with the other applicants, and you may very well demonstrate the highest financial need and/or the highest academic achievement.
- If you wish to apply for the scholarship, enter the VSAC ID in "Section II: Scholarships" of the Unified Scholarship Application (USA) on pages 35–36.

Step 5: Identify required documents.

- Read page 27 carefully to familiarize yourself with the various documents you may be required to submit for each VSAC-assisted scholarship. This page provides specific information on required documents, such as an explanation of what constitutes an official transcript.
- Locate the required documents chart (pages 28–33). Every VSAC-assisted scholarship is listed in alphabetical order by its VSAC ID, along with the documents required for that scholarship's application.
- Using the VSAC ID you entered in "Section II: Scholarships" of the Unified Scholarship Application, locate and **highlight on the chart** each scholarship for which you are applying.

Step 6: Submit required documents.

- Starting with the first VSAC ID that is highlighted on the chart, submit ALL required documents for that scholarship.
- Move to the next VSAC ID and submit the required documents you did NOT ALREADY SUBMIT for the first VSAC ID.
- Repeat this process until you have submitted ALL required documents for EVERY VSAC ID you highlighted on the chart.
- Please submit only ONE original of any particular document (duplicates will be discarded). Once it is on file with the VSAC Scholarships Program, it will be available to any group that requires it.
- All required documents, with the exception of Attachment C, must be labeled with your name and Social Security number. Attachment C requires your name and date of birth.

Quick search by county . . .

(VSAC-assisted scholarships only)

Neither of the following two lists is meant to be used as an exclusive list; in other words, simply because there are four scholarships listed for students from Essex County doesn't mean there are only four available to those students. It means simply that there are at least four. Note also that there may be further requirements for eligibility; for example, the scholarships listed for a particular county may have additional requirements involving fields of study, affiliation with a community organization, or other criteria.

- Reside in one of eight towns served by the Shoreham Telephone Company (Benson, Castleton, Cornwall, Hubbardton, Orwell, Shoreham, Sudbury, and Whiting)
- Demonstrate outstanding academic achievement and promise of continued excellence
- Demonstrate financial need

Checklist for success for VSAC-assisted scholarships

Complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

Scholarships that list financial need in their eligibility and selection criteria require that each applicant file a FAFSA. If you are not a Vermont resident or if you are enrolled in a graduate or professional degree program, you must submit a copy of your federal Student Aid Report (SAR).

Carefully review the scholarship descriptions.

VSAC-assisted scholarships on pages 6–26 are administered in part or in full by VSAC. To apply, use VSAC instructions (pages 2–3) and VSAC forms and attachments (pages 35–40).

Please note that the scholarships on pages 42–53 are administered by *other agencies or organizations*. To apply, follow the directions under the “Application” section for each scholarship. VSAC forms in this booklet cannot be used to apply for scholarships administered by agencies other than VSAC.

To be entered in a drawing to receive one of three \$1,000 scholarships,

submit **all** required documents so they are postmarked on or before the early-bird deadline of February 12. See complete official rules at www.vtac.org/scholarships.

Complete and submit required documents before the March 5 postmark deadline.

Follow the instructions on pages 2–3 carefully. Applicants who attempt to apply for VSAC-assisted scholarships without following the instruction steps usually have difficulty understanding and/or completing the process successfully.

Check EACH DOCUMENT before you submit it to the VSAC Scholarships Program.

Make sure each document submitted to the VSAC Scholarships Program, with the exception of Attachment C for recommendation letters, contains your name and Social Security number. Attachment C requires your name and date of birth.

Make sure each document is completed in full, signed, and dated (if applicable).

Check EACH RECOMMENDATION LETTER before you submit it to the VSAC Scholarships Program.

Make sure each recommendation letter contains the recommendation letter number and recommendation letter name, in addition to your name and date of birth.

Check EACH ESSAY before you submit it to the VSAC Scholarships Program.

Make sure each essay contains the essay number and essay name, in addition to your name and Social Security number.

Check the required documents chart carefully.

Make sure you submit all documents required for each VSAC-assisted scholarship for which you are applying. **Make sure that all required documents are postmarked on or before March 5.**

Submit original forms and documents to the VSAC Scholarships Program.

Remember to submit ONE original of any particular document (duplicates will be discarded). Once it is on file with the VSAC Scholarships Program, it will be available to any group that requires it.
